Twentieth Century Literary Criticism

A Reader

To identify the crucially important modern literary critics, and to sample their work is a difficult — and expensive — undertaking, such is the vast scope, variety and bulk of modern criticism.

This Reader meets a real need in collecting between the covers of a single volume representative work by fifty modern literary critics of the twentieth century. While the basic orientation of the anthology is towards English and American literature and criticism, certain continental European writers are included, whose ideas have influenced Anglo-American criticism. The editor's aim has been to select essays and extracts which are not merely examples of good critical writing, but which also illustrate distinctive and contrasting critical methods.

The contents are arranged chronologically, allowing the reader to follow the historical development of modern criticism; but alternative lists of contents are provided which group the materials according to the topics or genres discussed and according to the critical method adopted.

The historical and methodological significance of each item is further brought out in the editor's introductions which give concise biographical and bibliographical information about each author.

The whole book is a well-balanced, highly informative reader, equally useful as a course text-book or as a reference book for private use.

THE VISION OF HELL

DR D. D. R. OWEN, University of St Andrews

This book studies the theme of the infernal descent as it was handled in medieval French literature. To the people of the Middle Ages, Hell was not a subject for pious conjecture but a place of grim reality which could be visited. Dr Owen deals in detail with the various stories of these visits and the descriptions of the topography and the torments of Hell, showing how the theme could be treated in many ways according to the needs of the writer and those for whom he wrote.

The theme of the descent into Hell exemplified the triumph of humanity over death and mankind's victory in the ultimate struggle. The greatness of the theme might have been matched by the literature which it inspired but Dr Owen shows that the medieval French writers were unable to realise its full symbolic potential and that none came near the achievement of Dante. All too often the spiritual significance of the theme was obscured by its use as an adventure story and by the accumulation of vivid and minute detail.

A study of this aspect of French medieval literature, however, is most important as an investigation into the taste and the spirit of the age and into the nature of man and certain of his beliefs.
